This he did. He made arrangements to pick us up at our hotel where we met his wife/captiva Juana. They took us to a popular old typical Spanish

bodega/restaurante with big wine casks and bullfight posters lining the walls. There we met 2 other Brothers and their wives/captivas, Joaquin Perez-Marsa & Marta and Jose Angel Monreal ("Pepe") & Tove. We got to know each other and had a grand time. I was glad we understood and were able to converse in Spanish. I still remember the words of wisdom from Joaquin regarding Spanish wine."The best white wine is the red." It was great to experience the Spanish culture again.



We were invited to go the next day on Javier's boat "Sorgo" with Pepe and Tove for a cruise around the south end of the island. It was a great opportunity. After seeing some interesting beaches and developments we anchored in a little cove for a swim where Juana was swimming with some other friends. This is what I came for. After returning to the harbor/marina I invited them for lunch the following week.


