That part I got right.

While I still have not found the words to explain it, I experience the Spirit of the Brotherhood every time Brothers from different Tables get together. Do not miss the opportunity to spend time with Brothers from other Tables and other countries. The unique bond that you will experience is the real treasure of the Brotherhood of the Coast.





He next crewed on board the 98`Rhodes ketch *Fandango* for 5 1/2 years, cruising the Caribbean and the

USA .The owner of *Fandango* then had a 64` Hinkley built. Joe oversaw the construction and served as a captain on *Dalliance* for six years, a year of which his Captive, Maureen crewed on board.


